Realizing what the Bible is

But you, brothers, do not grow weary of doing good. II Thessalonians 3:13

There is also another reason we give thanks to God unceasingly, namely, when you received God's word, which you heard from us, you did not receive it as the word of men but as the word of God (as it really is), which is now at work in you who believe.

How do you view the Bible? Is it the words of men about God or the Word of God? How you answer that question makes the entire difference between your eternal soul being in heaven or being in hell. That is not just good old-fashioned tough-talk from a pastor. It is the judgment of St. Paul in his words to the Thessalonians. Look at the what Paul says to the Thessalonians, "You received God's word, which you heard from us, you did not receive it as the word of men but as the word of God (as it really is), which is now at work in you who believe."

The answer is a long, fancy word in theology to summarize what Paul is saying about the Word of God in this verse: *Autopistia*. The word means, "self-convincing." The Word of God is self-convincing. In other words, the reason that people believe the Word of God is the Word of God is because the Word of God itself convinces the hearer of it, the reader of it, that it really is the Word of God.

Again, think of the Thessalonians. For the most part, the majority of this congregation was Gentile. They had grown up steeped in false religions, worldly philosophies, and the darkened Greco-Roman world, that thrived on greed and bloodshed. Yet, in spite of all of these things, the Word of God Paul preached broke through their unbelief. They became convinced that Jesus was the Christ. They believed. They studied the Scriptures day and night. And most impressively, they began to walk according to that light. They left behind the idolatry, the immorality, the worldliness that had defined them.

It has been my experience that the denial or doubt about the power of the Word of God comes from staying away from it. The loudest denouncers of the Word of God are usually the people who have never read it and de-

nounce it only on the basis of the denunciations of others. Many years ago, my father and mother were chaperoning a trip to England. At dinner one evening, my parents struck up a conversation with the tour guide. She stated that she really enjoyed guiding my father's group from America. She remarked how well-behaved, respectful, and kind they were compared to other groups.

And then she said something shocking, "You and your group really believe all this Jesus stuff, don't you?" She was apparently surprised that such a group could hold such "unenlightened views" as Jesus is the Christ and the Word of God was the Word of God. But my father, rather than getting mad, asked her instead, "Well, yes, of course we do. But now may I ask you a question? Have you never read the Scriptures?" She sheepishly admitted, "No." "I suggest you do, and then ask your questions again." The next year, the same guide excitedly welcomed my father's group back and said, "You are right. There is something powerful and potent in those words."

I have lost count how many times I have had to rediscover the power of God's Word. Perhaps it is in a morning study, the preparation of a Bible Study or a sermon, a Bible information class, or the greeting of a parishioner after services. Why? Because the Spirit works through the Word, if we will be silent enough for a moment and let it speak. It is for this very reason that the Devil wishes to distract us constantly. The last thing the Devil want us to do is to listen to the life-giving voice of Jesus.

But we must! Even if it is just a five-minute quiet time during the day - it is enough. And an amazing thing happens. As our heart and mind are convinced that what we are hearing is God's Word, then our mouths, our eyes, our hands, our feet, and our ears will follow. We will lose the lust for the flesh a little bit more as we die and rise in Christ, we will love our neighbor more, and most importantly, we will love our Jesus more. Therefore, dear members, realize what the Word of God is! It is the very voice of God speaking to you, at work in you, strengthening you, guiding you, and preparing you for eternity.

Amen.

## Thrivent Choice Dollar Upgrade

The Thrivent Choice program has been upgraded, making it even easier for Thrivent clients with membership to live generously and support organizations like Zion, God's Treasures, Prairie Lutheran School, Minnesota Valley Lutheran High School and Martin Luther College.

Prior to this time, select members received Choice Dollars to donate. Now, over 1.9 million members of Thrivent receive Choice Dollars.

## God's Treasures July Report

July 9, 2026

June passed quickly at God's Treasures, with a full schedule of indoor and outdoor activities. Summer attendance increased by about 25%, requiring adjustments to staffing and routines, especially after two full-time teachers departed and one full-time teacher, three aides, and new summer substitutes joined us. One of the most successful changes has been splitting breakfast and lunch into two meal periods, which helps staff serve students more efficiently and decreases the noise level in the dining room.

Students have been enjoying the warmer weather. Our oldest two classrooms have been walking to the city park at least once weekly, and now that the splash pad is available, those visits may become more frequent. Our school age classroom has also been venturing to the library weekly for an afternoon activity.

We are continuing our search for caterers in the area who would be willing to make our students' lunch on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays at a price that is sustainable for our center. In option we are also trialing and considering long-term is paying a part-time individual to prep our meals on site. This is currently the lowest cost option. Also, we now receive the double benefit of claiming all meals served to children as part of the food program, which means that we receive partial reimbursement for the cost of claimed meals. There is no guarantee that, when a caterer is found, we will be able to claim lunch which would then result in a net increase.

We officially received our Three-Star Parent Aware rating effective July 1. The rating is valid for two years, after which we'll have the option to renew as a Three or Four-Star program. The missing piece for our Four-Star rating was having formal assessments completed. We have held twice annual parent-teacher conferences as required of a licensed child care center since 2024, but the paper assessment tool we were using was abbreviated for the teachers who had no familiarity with our chosen tool, COR Advantage. As of March, we moved away from paper and subscribed to the online COR Advantage assessment tool called Kaymbu. The online version will simplify the assessment requirement while adding value to parents as their child ages and develops.

Ms. Paige Mathiowetz (MVL alum!) has been a great addition to our team in the preschool transition room. She's taken hold of the reigns that Mrs. Ritter handed off and without missing a step. We are re-evaluating infant and toddler teacher positions and classroom sizes since we are currently down one full-time teacher. This is yet another moment when I wish I knew the plans that God has in store for us. I remain confident that this challenge is another blessing God's sending our way and that He absolutely has a plan that He's reveling day-by-day according to His perfect timing. We must remain patient and flexible as our center evolves accordingly.

As the weight on our shoulders can seem heavy from compounding hardships, allow Psalm 39:7 to serve as another reminder of the source of our ultimate and certain hope: "But now what do I wait for, Lord? My hope is in you". Enjoy the rest of your July. With this year being the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of our nation it takes little to no effort to see and experience the gifts God provides. Don't let these gifts overshadow our hope.

## PLS Preschool/Kindergarten Classroom Assistant, Remedial Teacher

The Preschool and Kindergarten Classroom Assistant will assist and support the lead teacher in creating a Christ-centered safe, and nurturing environment for young children.
